### FEATURED PLANTS

#### Ficus lyrata

(West Africa)

These plants generally start life on top of another tree. Once happy with their chosen tree, they send their roots down to the bottom of the host tree to strangulate it, eventually taking over and using the central trunk as its own.

#### Ficus benjamina, AKA Weeping Fig

(Australia and Asia)

The largest recorded tree, in India, boasts a crown size of 131 metres! It is also the official tree of Bangkok.

#### Rhipsalis cassutha, AKA 'Mistletoe Cactus'

(Africa, Sri Lanka and Central America)

It is believed that migrating birds brought seeds, of these plants, all the way to the eastern hemisphere.

#### Epipremnum aureum, AKA Scindapsus

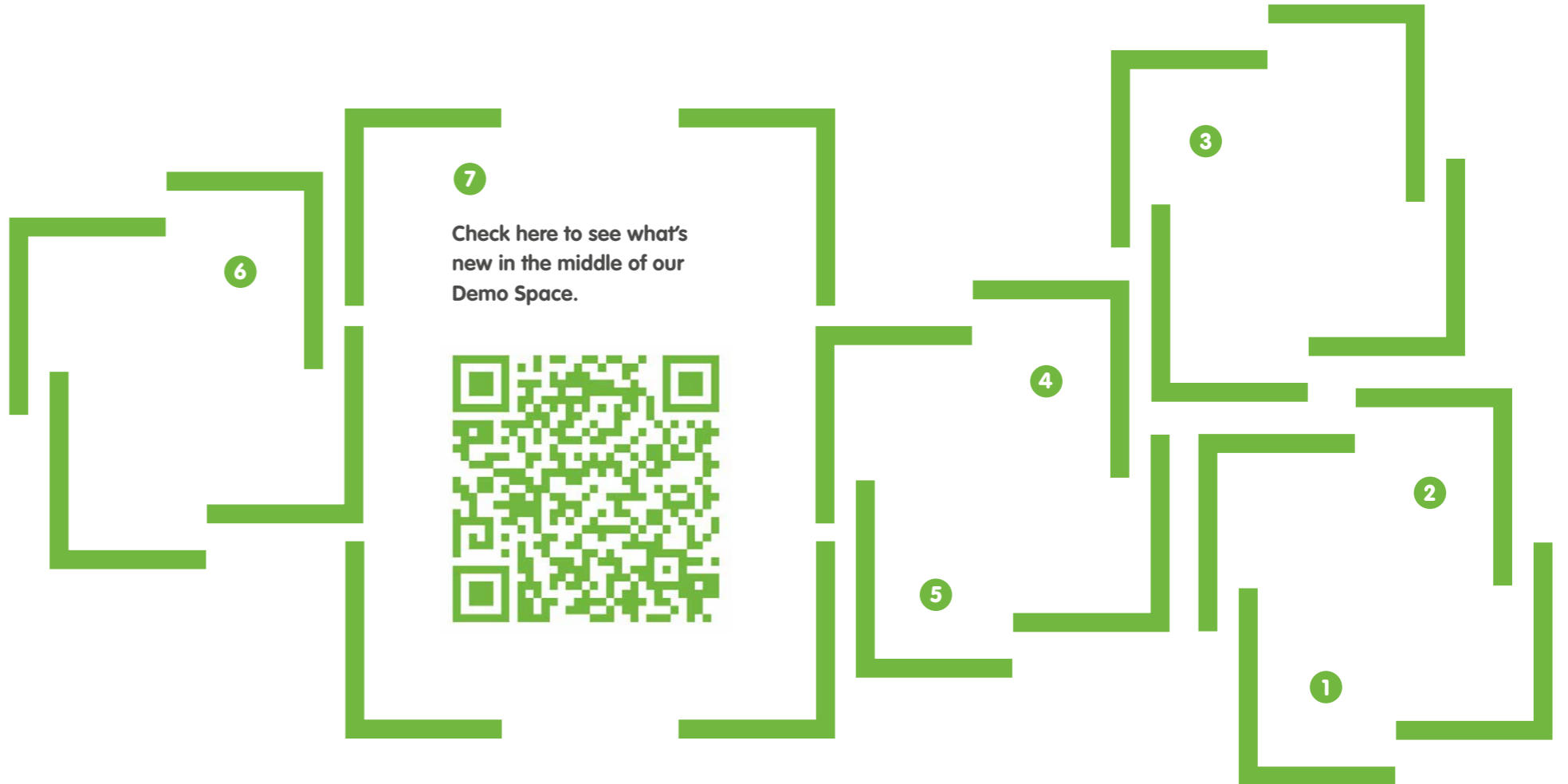
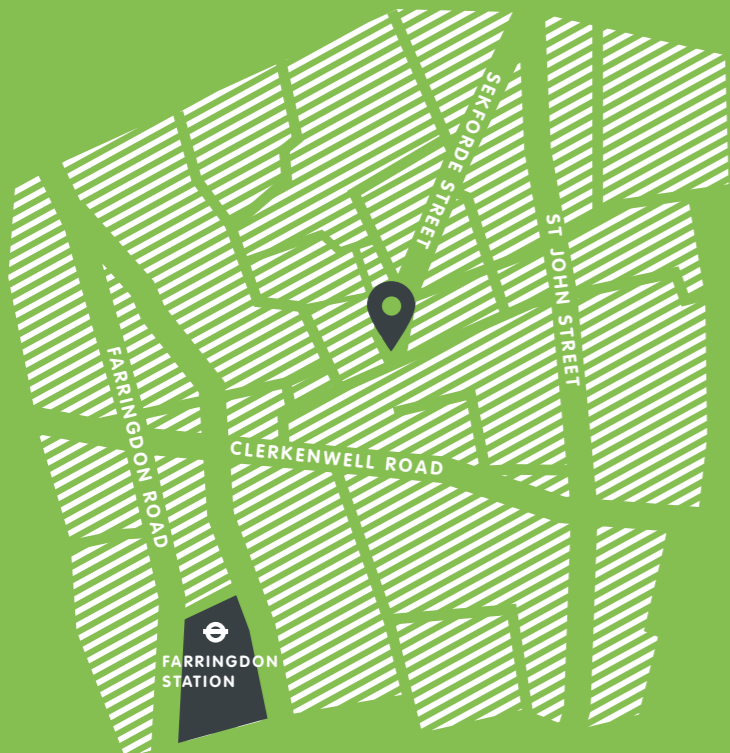
(French Polynesia)

Nicknamed 'Triffids' for their ability to flourish almost anywhere. Scindapsus found their way into every forest in the world, eventually creeping into many European and North American homes.

#### Philodendron scandens

(Colombia)

The Philodendron family is so vast that there are still undiscovered species. The name comes from their heart shaped leaves; From the Greek word 'Philo', meaning love and affection.
